My 'ear' isn't that good nor my timing (as many of you have already noticed but have been too polite to point out) so I find covering other people's music a struggle sometimes. But if I can do things my way, it comes naturally. I think it's a case of being able to express myself emotionally and the only person who can do that honestly and spontaneously is yourself.

When I was playing in bands, I used to use notes on the guit to show the vocalist how the melody line went. I recently sent Schprocket a reggae song arrangement and the next day he sent it back with a melody line he scat sang on top. All I had to do was turn his scat line into lyrics and hey presto! the song was finished. It's a method I'll probably use again on collabs as it gives the vocalist the opportunity to do things their way. Plus they don't have to listen to my appallingly bad 'guide'tracks. I 'sang' one to Schprock over Skype last year and he hasn't seen his cat since.

Q.8 You have a great sense of humour Mick. Where does that come from?

I'm not sure. Like a lot of things in life it may be trial and error. Something one person finds amusing another may find annoying. In the end though, IMO you have to be true to yourself and decide what you think is both funny and socially acceptable at the same time.

While Perth is a great place to live, it's tough if you want to play original music as there is such a small population and only a small percentage of that is interested. So no matter how often I worked, I made little if any money at all after paying for strings, rehersal rooms, P.A. hire, road crew wages, posters, recording etc etc. I did play in cover bands but found that wasn't very rewarding spiritually. You could do the worst version of the Kinks' "Lola" in the history of Western Civilisation (out of tune, unco-ordinated and generally awful) and people would go nuts. I suppose it was because they already knew the song. I guess that makes me a snob musically but it was something I found depressing and unrewarding, even if I was getting paid for it

Q.10. I notice you said you like Gaelic melody. What are your origins? Do you have any Gaelic blood?

I've had a lot of Gaelic blood **on** me when playing in Irish bars!

Seriously though, I have been told I have an Irish and Danish heritage from way back. The thing I like about Gaelic melodies are the combinations of notes. I don't know enough theory to be specific but I know it makes me feel good. Like the first time I heard 'The Twist' by Chubby Checker (what a voice!) or 'Paranoid' by Black Sabbath. It felt like my feet had been nailed to the floor and nothing in the world existed except for the sound coming out of a tiny, tinny transistor radio. Ahh, memories......

Q.11. Does anything annoy you?

Lots of things but someone once said to me "When the going gets tough, turn the TV on and you'll see 300 billion people worse off than you are". I don't know if the figure is accurate but the sentiment certainly struck a chord with me. It's a philosphy I try and live by. Notice I said 'try'.

Jimbo too. His song "Things are looking up" is one of my favourites. I loved TJ's stuff because his feel is so good.

Q.13 Have you ever collaborated with another member or members on a recording.

I've done a few songs with Smurf & Schprock, just the 3 of us. I've collaborated with GC, PapaG, Jimbo, yergoodself Dave, Ag, TJ, BigB, TeeEff and Mung. Joom gave me a couple of great lines for DWDTT and just recently I played on BB's "18 wheels of hardened steel" and she sent me a keyboard line for "Snowing" (a title I stole from you, Dave).

Q.14 Which of your colabs did you enjoy most and why?

'Suicide' because I got to play with TeeEff again. We were in a band together a long time ago and not only is he great musician and all-around-nice-guy, he plays fretless bass and his sound and style became an integral part of the songs I was writing at the time. Unfortunately, his circumstances have changed and he is no longer available.

Q.15 Have you a favourite mix from our bandroom? (Could be one of your own.)

Too many to list here but Jimbo's "Things are looking up" is a killer track, IMO.

Q.16 What is your ambition both musically and personally?

Personally, to live long enough to see my 2 boys grow up and be happy and successfull in their chosen fields (one's already there).

Musically, to keep writing songs that other people bring to life through their contributions. Oh yeah, learn another scale apart from the same one I've been using for the last 30 years!
